**REPORTS FROM MAYOR AND/OR DEPARTMENT HEADS**

**Mayor Fleisher** addressed the recent winter storm, noting it was the most significant in nearly a decade and thanking residents for their patience and cooperation. He highlighted the unique challenges of the storm, including its long duration, snow and ice accumulation, and extreme cold. He commended the Department of Public Works for working extended shifts to clear approximately 250 miles of roadways and for continuing follow-up efforts in neighborhoods, cul-de-sacs, and school areas. He also thanked administrative staff and emphasized the Township's planning, communication, and post-storm evaluation efforts.

The Mayor thanked residents for engaging with the Township through the website, social media, and the MyCherryHill app, and noted that the Office of Emergency Management activated the Emergency Operations Center during the storm. He expressed appreciation to OEM members, as well as the fire and police departments, and specifically recognized police officers and their families for their service.

During a time of national unrest, Mayor Fleisher reaffirmed his strong support for the Cherry Hill Police Department, emphasizing its commitment to professionalism, integrity, accountability, and community policing. He noted that the Township Council ensures the department receives necessary resources and training and praised Chief Ostermueller's leadership. He highlighted the department's strong community relationships through outreach, events, and school involvement.

The Mayor also referenced several recent community events, including the January 9 promotion ceremony for 11 police department members, participation in an MLK Day of Service youth leadership program on January 19, and the observance of International Holocaust Remembrance Day. He acknowledged the rise in antisemitism and noted the upcoming observance of Black History Month and its 100th anniversary.

In closing, Mayor Fleisher reminded residents that winter conditions may continue, encouraged neighbors to look out for one another, thanked residents for calling Cherry Hill home, and expressed his appreciation for the community.

**PUBLIC COMMENTS:**

**Sara Joslin**

**Cherry Hill, NJ**

Ms. Joslin thanked Township service workers and residents for their efforts during the most significant storm in over a decade, expressed gratitude to neighbors who helped one another, and cautioned residents about continued extreme cold and the possibility of additional storms. She emphasized the importance of supporting individuals experiencing homelessness, acknowledged those involved in the annual homeless count and shelter services, recognized the 20th anniversary of the Cherry Hill Food Pantry, and thanked community organizations, businesses, and local leadership for addressing food insecurity and special needs.

**Rick Short**

**Cherry Hill, NJ**

Mr. Short criticized the Mayor's recent social media posts regarding events in Minnesota and Muslim-related topics, stating that he felt the rhetoric was divisive and did not reflect the views of a significant portion of the community. He expressed concern about what he described as increasing political and racial division, objected to the use of inflammatory labels such as "white supremacist" or "Nazi" in public discourse and schools, and stated that he believes such language is unacceptable in Cherry Hill.

**Jeff Podowitz**

**Cherry Hill, NJ**

Mr. Podowitz urged the Mayor and Council to speak out against what he described as longstanding and ongoing inequities in state school funding for Cherry Hill, citing historical testimony, data, and graphs showing that the Township has received significantly less state aid than calculations indicate it should have received, despite having property tax rates well above the state average. He requested that prior testimony and supporting materials be posted publicly and emphasized that he believes stronger advocacy is needed to prevent further financial harm to the school district and taxpayers.

**Anne Einhorn**

**Cherry Hill, NJ**

Ms. Einhorn expressed appreciation for the Department of Public Works' efforts during the recent significant snowfall and shared personal challenges with snow and ice removal, noting the ongoing impact of weather conditions. She thanked Councilman Connor for offering assistance to residents, urged patience regarding service delays due to the storm, encouraged neighbors to help one another, and expressed gratitude to Township staff, residents, and departments for their efforts.

**Ilana Yares**

**Cherry Hill, NJ**

Ms. Yares expressed concerns about snow removal in her neighborhood, stating that plows repeatedly cleared only one side of her street and left her unable to exit her driveway, and questioned enforcement regarding parked vehicles that impeded plowing. She also raised safety concerns related to narrowed roadways, bus access, and private plowing pushing snow into public streets, and asked that snow removal practices be reviewed for future storms.

**After seeing no further comments, Council President Carter closed the Public Comment.**

**Mayor Fleisher** acknowledged the concerns raised by Ms. Yares and stated that the Business Administrator would look into the issues and follow up with a response, noting that the Township has been addressing reported trouble spots throughout the storm.

## **COMMENTS OF COUNCIL**

**Councilman Connor** thanked Ms. Einhorn for her kind words and offered assistance with her driveway. He also highlighted his participation in the MLK Day Youth Leadership and Service Workshop at Town Hall, recognizing fellow Council members and the community for their involvement, and expressed appreciation for donations of hygiene kits for individuals in shelters.

**Councilman DiRenzo** shared that he attended the Eagle Scout Court of Honor for Boy Scouts Troop 3070, where two Cherry Hill residents were awarded the rank of Eagle Scout, and noted that another resident will receive the rank later in the month. He also reflected on Martin Luther King Jr. Day, highlighting the quote, "We may have all come on different ships, but we're in the same boat now," emphasizing unity and shared destiny as a meaningful message for the community.

**Councilwoman Doshi** thanked residents for attending the meeting and highlighted the first Mayor's Wellness Walk of the year, noting January as National Mental Wellness Month and recognizing Jefferson Health for its support and educational contributions. She also expressed gratitude to DPW for their efforts during the recent storm and to the Cherry Hill Police for their professionalism and positive community interactions.

**Councilwoman Hulnick** reflected on Martin Luther King Jr.'s legacy, sharing a personal connection through her great-uncle and praising his message of service. She also highlighted her participation in Kol Ami's Mitzvah Day, a Muslim Heritage event at the library, and a PBS film screening, thanking volunteers and community members for fostering learning, creativity, and inclusiveness.

**Council Vice President Golkow** highlighted Temple Beth Shalom's Mitzvah Day, recognizing volunteers of all ages for service projects supporting food pantries and victims of domestic violence, and thanked the Mayor for attending. She also acknowledged Holocaust Remembrance Day, emphasizing the ongoing threat of antisemitism and the importance of learning from history, and echoed the call for unity in standing against hatred.

**Councilwoman Apell** echoed her colleagues' remarks and stressed the importance of shoveling street corners to ensure children can safely wait for the school bus during snowy conditions. She also highlighted upcoming Township events, including the iHeart Art Youth Program at Croft Farm, the Mayor's Wellness Walk, and a Jazz Quartet performance later in February.

**Council President Carter** recognized three Cherry Hill residents honored at the Camden County 2026 Freedom Medal Ceremony for their leadership and service, and shared his appreciation for attending the Muslim Heritage Month film screening and the Youth Leadership and Service Workshop. He also thanked Councilman Connor and DPW for their efforts during the recent snowstorm and concluded by encouraging the community to strive to do better for one another.
